Five Senses Fingerplay

(from: Gryphon House)

I have eyes so I can see (curl fingers of both hands around eyes like binoculars)
The smallest leaf (point fingers close together)

On the tallest tree. (hands go high overhead) My ears can hear the cars go by. (cup hands behind ears)

My lips can taste some apple pie. (*lick your lips*)

My nose can smell a rose so sweet, *(touch your nose)*

And tell me when it's time to eat. (*rub your tummy*)

My hands can pet a kitten's fur, (*make stroking motion*)
And touch its chest to feel it purr.
My five senses help me very well,

To see, hear, taste, touch and smell. (touch related body part with each word)
